She was nominated for an Emmy award and won a duPont-Columbia award for her PBS Frontline documentary about the 2014 Ebola outbreak in West Africa. She has reported on LGBTQ rights and conversion therapy, covered the refugee crisis in the Middle East, reported on women's rights in Ireland, and investigated the role of Wall Street in the opioid crisis in the US.



RICHARD FLANAGAN

Richard Flanagan is an acclaimed novelist, born in Longford, Tasmania in 1961. He is the author of many remarkable books, including Death of a River Guide, The Sound of One Hand Clapping, Gould's Book of Fish, The Unknown Terrorist, Wanting, and The Narrow Road to the Deep North. These novels have received critical acclaim and have been published in 42 countries around the world, cementing Flanagan's reputation as a truly global literary figure.

In 2014, Flanagan was awarded the prestigious Booker Prize for his novel, The Narrow Road to the Deep North. This powerful and poignant book tells the story of an Australian doctor caught up in the horrors of the Burma Death Railway during World War II.



RICK O' SHEA

Broadcaster | Book CLub Founder | Festival Patron

Rick O'Shea is an experienced radio presenter with RTE since 2001. He began his career on RTE 2FM before moving to RTE Gold, where he presents weekday mornings and The Gold Lounge jazz show. He is also a former presenter of The Book Show and The Poetry Programme on RTE Radio 1. Rick is a prominent figure in the Irish literary scene. He is the founder of The Rick O'Shea Book Club, which is the largest book club in Ireland with almost 40.000 members.

Rick's contributions to the Irish literary scene have been widely recognized. He has received numerous accolades, including the Best Irish Book Blogger award in 2015 and the Best Arts and Culture Blog award in 2017. He is also a regular contributor to various newspapers and magazines, including the Irish Examiner and the Irish Times. He has served as a judge for the Bookseller UK and Ireland Young Adult Book Prize and the Costa Book Awards and became one of the festival's patrons in 2023.

Ciaran Mullooly is a journalist and the author of three books. His first book, "Death on Holy Thursday: The Shooting of John Carthy in Abbeylara," was published in 2008. In 2016, he published his second book, "Back to the Future: Reflections on a Career in Journalism".

His third book, "The Future is Now: Life after RTÉ and the challenge facing the midlands," was published in 2023. He has worked as a former RTE News correspondent, enterprise worker, tourism officer, and community development worker with Ballyleague Village Renewal and multiple rural groups and communities. He is married to Angela and has two sons, Bryan and Eoghan. Mullooly currently resides in Ballyleague, Lanesborough.



Mary Reynolds is the former Longford County Librarian and former Head of Creative Ireland Longford. She has a long history of supporting both arts and literature across the county.

John Murry in conversation

John Murry is an American musician, singer-songwriter, composer and producer. His debut album, "The Graceless Age", gained critical acclaim in 2013. He collaborates with artists like Bob Frank and Chuck Prophet, and his music blends country, rock, and folk influences.

MANCHÁN MAGAN

Writer | Gaeilgeoir | Filmmaker

Manchán Magan is a writer and documentary maker. He has written books on his travels in Africa, India, and South America, as well as two novels. He writes occasionally for The Irish Times, reports on travel for various radio programmes, and has presented dozens of documentaries on issues of world culture for TG4, RTÉ & Travel Channel.

His books Thirty-Two Words For Field and Tree Dogs, Banshee Fingers and Other Words For Nature are acclaimed best-sellers. His latest Children's Book, Wolf-Men and Water Hounds sees Manchán uncover the secrets of our island through magical landmarks across the country.



WOLF-MEN AND WATER HOUNDS

The Myths, Monsters and Magic of Ireland

Traveling province by province through Ireland, Manchán outlines the stories most closely associated with each site, focussing on a specific beast or creature from legend and highlighting a magical word or phrase in Irish alongside.

Discover the dobharchú or water hound of Achill Island; the enchanted sow Cailcheir of Sligo's Keash Caves; the Burren's ollphéist or great serpent; the Caoránach or hairy worm of Lough Derg; the one-eyed salmon of Ballyshannon; and the man wolves of Ossory, County Kilkenny, amongst many others.

2024 Artist-in Residence Noel Monahan

Granard native and renowned poet Noel Monahan reads from his upcoming collection of poetry, Journey Upstream, where he navigates mythic landscapes to country towns and urban living.



Noel Monahan is a native of Granard, Co. Longford, and is now living in Cavan. He has won numerous awards for his poetry and writing. He has published seven collections of poetry with Salmon Poetry. An eight collection, Celui Qui Porte Un Veau, a selection of French translations of his work, was published in France by Alidades in 2014. A selection of Italian translations of his poetry was published in Milan by Guanda in November 2015: "Tra Una Vita E L'Altra". His poetry was prescribed text for the Leaving Certificate English, 2011- 2012. His play: " Broken Cups" won the RTE P.J. O'Connor award in 2001, and Chalk Dust, a long poem of his, was adapted for stage and directed by Padraic McIntyre, Ramor Theatre, 2019. During the COVID-19 lockdown, Noel had to reinvent his poetry readings, and he produced a selection of Short Films: "Isolation & Creativity", "Still Life", "Tolle Lege", and A Poetry Day Ireland Reading for Cavan Library, 2021. Recently, he edited "Chasing Shadows", a collection of poetry for Creative Ireland. Salmon Poetry will publish his ninth poetry collection, "Journey Upstream, " in 2024.

Journey Upstream is Noel Monahan's ninth collection of poetry. Here, Monahan navigates mythic landscapes to country towns and urban living. Monahan loves to interrogate our past, our heritage and the poet's place in today's world of rapid change. The final section of the collection, Maynooth Calling, deals with the poet's short stay at Maynooth's Seminary, once the largest seminary in the world. This is another of Monahan's long prose poems, now familiar to many, and this finely wrought poem, both lyrical and satirical, comes alive with enthralling dramatic effect on the page.

Anne-Marie Tomchak is a writer, broadcaster and entrepreneur focusing on technology and sustainability. She has senior experience at the BBC, Mashable, and Voque. She founded ShareJoy, a non-profit that resells pre-loved fashion to support Pieta, a mental health charity, and DesignTracker,

a service for eco-friendly homes. Anne-Marie has been featured in TIME, Forbes, The Drum, and Allbright. She is a columnist for the Irish Independent, a contributor to Glamour UK, and a TV presenter. Her documentary "Game Changer: Al and You" premiered in November 2023, and her digital wellbeing work is a Junior Cycle resource.

Lottie Jackson is a disability activist, writer and editor who redefines what it means to be disabled. She was featured in the Sunday Times Style's Women of the Year 2020 list and has written for numerous publications including British Voque and the Guardian. In 2020, she was selected for Penguin Random

House's award-winning WriteNow programme. Lottie will be joining us via zoom.

Martin Doyle in conversation with Hilary White

Martin Doyle, discusses his new book Dirty Linen with journalist and writer Hilary White. Dirty Linen is a personal, intimate history of the Troubles seen through the microcosm of a single rural parish, the author's own, part of both the Linen Triangle – heartland of the North's defining industry – and the Murder Triangle – the Badlands devastated by paramilitary violence.



Martin Doyle is Books Editor of The Irish Times, where he has worked since 2007. He is a former Editor of The Irish Post in London, where he worked from 1992 to 2001, and also worked for The Times in London from 2001-2006. He is the author of Dirty Linen: The Troubles in My Own Place which was shortlisted for Irish Nonfiction Book of the Year.

He has essays in The 32: An Anthology of Irish Working-Class Voices, ed. Paul McVeigh and A Handbook of the Northern Ireland Troubles and peace process, eds. Laura McAtackney and Máirtín Ó Catháin. He edited A History of The Irish Post in 2000 to mark the newspaper's 30th anniversary. He was also an extra in Father Ted.



Hilary White is a writer, arts journalist and conservationist from Dublin. He is a regular contributor to the Sunday and Irish Independents, and RTE Arena. His writing has featured in the Irish Times, Irish Examiner, The Dublin Review, Winter Papers, and Tolka.

He is a recipient of the Literature Bursary and Agility awards from the Arts Council of Ireland, and was chosen for the inaugural Paul McVeigh Residency 2023.

Patrick deWitt in conversation with Dani Gill

Patrick deWitt, the author of the critically acclaimed Ablutions: Notes for a Novel and The Sisters Brothers, which was shortlisted for the Booker Prize, chats with Longford Poet and Curator Dani Gill. His new book The Librarianist tells the story of Bob Comet, a man who has lived his life through and for literature, unaware that his own experience is a poignant and affecting narrative.



PATRICK DEWITT

Writer | Screenwriter

Patrick deWitt has written several acclaimed books, including The Sisters Brothers, Ablutions, Undermajordomo Minor, French Exit, and his latest work, The Librarianist, released in 2023. The Sisters Brothers won the Governor General's Award and was shortlisted for the Booker and Walter Scott prizes.

It was also adapted into a film by Jacques Audiard, starring Jake Gyllenhaal, Joaquin Phoenix, Riz Ahmed, and John C. Reilly, and was released in 2018. French Exit was shortlisted for the Scotiabank Giller Prize and also adapted into a film released in 2020. Originally from British Columbia, Canada, deWitt now calls Portland, Oregon his home.



Dani Gill is a writer, poet, educator and curator based in western Ireland. She has worked with various arts organizations since 2009, including Cúirt International Festival of Literature and Galway Theatre Festival. Dani is interested in promoting public engagement, cross-art-form collaborations, poetry advocacy, and supporting writers. She is a published poet and also writes reviews for The Irish Times.

Her first poetry book, After Love, was published in 2017 and her second, Lessons in Kindness, will be published in April 2023. Dani is currently the Performing Arts Curator for the Bealtaine Festival, Director of The Lighthouse Project and Co-Director of Match in the Dark.

He is the co-author of the award winning book, black and Irish: legends, trailblazers, and everyday heroes.



Uruemu Adejinmi's political journey started in 2016 after she supported a local candidate during the general election. When her neighbour asked her to join Fianna Fáil, she soon engaged in the party's activity.In 2021, Cllr Uruemu Adejinmi made history. In a series of firsts, she was elected Mayor of Longford Municipal District as simultaneously the first migrant, African and black female to become Mayor in Ireland.

Now, she appeals to others to represent their communities.
